1.	The proposal / function

	The People Directorate currently contracts with 26 organisations for generalist residential and nursing accommodation under spot contracts, covering 48 Homes across the City. The current negotiated contract has been in place since April 2014, and reflects the price structure that was agreed by Cabinet in 2016. The delivery of these residential care services enable the Local Authority to meet their statutory duties under the Care Act 2014.
1.2	Description of the proposal / function
	Our current fee setting arrangements end on 31 st March 2018. We now need to agree our fee structure for the next four years and develop a new contract which reflects the changing needs of the people we support, the residential care market and our providers. Providers of general residential care services are to be invited to consultation meetings to discuss our proposal and feedback their comments. Following this consultation period a report will be presented to Cabinet which will reflect the feedback received during the consultation exercise. Cabinet will then set the fee structure for residential and nursing care services within the City. Following completion of the consultation and setting of the new fee structure, the aim would be to carry out a one stage procurement exercise for a flexible procurement agreement. Should providers not engage in the consultation exercise, or agree with the fee setting process or fees set, there is the potential that these providers will not take part in the procurement exercise. This could result in there being no overarching contractual framework and a risk of providers refusing to contract on the Council's terms
	The Council does not intend moving any residents currently living in Homes that may not be in contract with the Authority in the future.
